


Welcome to the first Reading newsletter.

Learning to read



How to get the most out of reading with your child at home. Pupils who are learning to read follow the **Read, Write Inc** programme.

Your child will receive a reading scheme book to support their reading of new sounds and they should be able to read 95% of the book without difficulty.

Read number 1:



Look at the cover of the book.

Explore what it might be about. Have you had any experiences that link to the

content of this book? Read the book.

This doesn't have to be the whole thing in one go.

Read number 2:



Read the book again but practise use of voices and expression.

Notice punctuation and alter voice to reflect this. It is helpful if you as the adult model this and for your child to copy you.

Read number 3:



Read the book again with expression but this time, build comprehension through questions and the use of 'I wonder...'






Ten top tips for reading stories to your child

Make reading to your child feel like a treat. Introduce each new book with excitement.
Make it a special quiet time and cuddle up so both of you can see the book.
Show curiosity in what you're going to read: Oh no! What is going to happen?
Read the whole story the first time explaining parts that you think your child might not understand
Chat about the story: I wonder why he did that? Oh no, I hope she's not going to
Avoid asking too many questions.
Link stories to your own experiences (e.g. This reminds me of \cdots)
Read favourite stories over and over again. Get your child to join in with the bits they know.
Read with enthusiasm. Try out different voices.
Read with enjoyment If you're not enjoying it, your child won't.
